We would like to send our sincere sympathies to Jean's family.





SPECIALIST & RARE VARIETY OPEN SHOW - 2006

reported by Ghalib Al-Nasser, Show Organiser

Once again a phenomenal success for the **18th Show** of the *Specialist & Rare Variety Open Show* with a terrific atmosphere and a real buzz to the weekend. The show received an increase in total entry to 1099, which was slightly up from last year's entry (1000) of which a total of 839 birds were benched from 83 exhibitors.

The atmosphere was vibrant on the Sunday, with plenty of time for everyone to socialise as well as appreciate the quality of the exhibits staged at this national event. The sponsorship list once again was great with the usual sponsorship received from Rosettes R Russ, for all the open rosettes for the show; also from Les & Pat Martin who sponsored the cost of all the ceramic awards to the judges and Best of Colours, which are much appreciated and sought after by exhibitors. The B.S. President Dave Cottrell donated a quality bird for the most benched birds in the beginner section, which was won by M.J. Peel. Norman & June Cox sponsored the show with the cost of printing the coloured covers for the schedules and catalogues. Financial sponsorship came from Mick Anzara who donated £50 towards the raffle prices, Neil & Keith Johnson who also donated £50 and Jan Hill who donated £25. Other sponsorship came from Ghalib & Janice Al-Nasser, Sue & Rod Clarke and Gren & Pat Norris. The following fanciers were generous with their donation of birds for the raffle; Amos & Thumwood, G. Capes, M & M Chapman, L. Cutler, F, S & K Eatwell, I & P Fielding, W. Gibson, J. Grubb, C & D Jones and C. Thorne.

Once again the overseas awards were much in evidence and most sought after, with the Australian judge Warren Wilson, CEO of the Budgerigar Rare & Specialist Exhibitors of Australasia (BRASEA) and Feathered Friends Radio, awarding the top BRASEA patronage to the show with 8 coloured paintings, 50 rosettes and 36 medals together with 3 new trophies from Australia. All the judges and committee members received wooden handled pens and special Australian cuddly toys.

The Show Committee extends its sincere gratitude and appreciation to all the above sponsors as well as the Budgerigar Society, the six specialist societies, the ten area societies and Budgerigar World who all gave splendid support in granting their highest patronage to the show. Gratitude is also extended to all the workers, exhibitors and donors for making this year's show another great success.

Apart from our regular fanciers from Scotland, Wales and Jersey, who travelled long distances to be with us, we also had the pleasure of our regular overseas visitors from Holland & Germany.

Sunday afternoon was the time for trophy presentation and on this occasion the Guest of Honour was Warren Wilson, President of the B.S. of New South Wales, who presented the 43 trophies together with the paintings donated by BRASEA to the show.

As in previous years at this show, partnerships did well in gaining 15 of the 24 CCs on offer and 21 of the CCs were awarded to the champion section.

Next year's show will be staged on 30th June & 1st July (week 26).

INCREASE IN DOMINANT PIEDS

Margaret Dark judged the 82 dominant pieds and awarded Brian Wilson's skyblue cock from the novice section as best dominant pied any age. This bird, staged in good show condition, possessed good length and spots. Mark Handley (novice) staged a light green hen of good width of shoulders and spots in second place followed by Alec & Dave Woan's light green cock of good top end. Jeff Attwood benched another Frosted (Dutch) Pied, green cock, was the best Clearflight any age and best overall. Ben Kyle had a blue cock in the junior any age section.

Alec & Dave Woan came to the fore to win the young bird award and best dominant pied in show with a wide headed light green hen of good width of shoulders and depth of mask. A light green cock of good size and width from the Thorpe & Stanley partnership was second. Mark Handley was third with a light green cock staged in good condition. Ben Kyle staged a light green cock to win the best overall junior young bird in show.

RECESSIVE PIEDS OF QUALITY

Once again the Recessive Pied entry exceeded that of the Dominant Pied and there were 84 (drop in entry from last year) for Dave Cottrell to judge. The Eatwell partnership headed this section with a cinnamon grey cock that also took the award for best recessive pied in show and also best overall pied in show. An outstanding quality bird with good shoulders and lots of blow over the eyes. Michael & Margaret Chapman were second with a dark green cock of good marking. A dark-eyed clear white cock of good

solid colour from the international partnership of Bill Searle and Terry Knott was placed third and best dark-eyed clear in show. The opposite sex award went to Dave Spruce's grey green hen of good quality but of solid black wing marking.

Geoff Capes headed the young bird section with a dark green hen of quality with good size and deep mask. The Eatwell family were second with another quality cinnamon grey cock of good length but short on flights on both wings. The Searle & Knott partnership was third with another dark-eyed clear white cock of good wide shoulders but short in tail.

Patronage Corner. By Pat Fielding

It's that mad time of year for me and the postman again. Patronage return envelopes are coming through the door on a daily basis. It is clear from the returns that the number of pieds on the show bench is increasing. Some shows have shown an increase in Dominant Pieds benched whilst others have shown an increase in the Recessive pied benched entry.

Several problems have arisen this year with the patronage. Patronage is sent out quite soon after the application has been received. Usually by the end of March all patronage rosettes have been dispatched. It is surprising how many rosettes seem to have gone missing this year. I have had a number of members contact me for rosettes that they have won but the show secretary has mislaid or denied receiving. A solution to this problem would be to change the rosettes so that they say Best Dominant or Recessive in section rather than name the section. This would mean that everyone should get their rosettes as in most shows rosettes for all sections are not awarded. Another problem has been the new postage rules. We have received several returns with the incorrect postage on them. Every time this happens it costs the VBC the difference in postage and £1 handling charge. (Today a 2p under postage has cost the VBC £1.02 (sorry Eric!))

As we have not been able to get a new sponsor for the Gold and Silver badge certificates these will be phased out as the stock runs out. I have probably got enough for next year if I'm lucky but then they are gone. If someone has a spare £500 or so to sponsor the replacement of the cards please get in touch. As I keep a record of the Gold and Silver card wins on my computer for the allocation of the VBC Exhibitor of the year awards I can send out the badges automatically once 20 wins have been accumulated. This will probably mean that we will use more badges because at present they are rarely claimed. A list of winners for the VBC exhibitor of the year will appear in the February magazine.

Don't forget the VBC club show in November incorporated in the BS Club show at the dome in Doncaster. Each Class winner gets a rosette and either a Gold or Silver Card. Silver salvers are up for grabs for Best Dominant Pied Any Age and Young Bird and for Best Recessive Pied Any Age and Young Bird.

The Way Ahead, by Mick Watton.

As a first year new members to your club, most of you will find it surprising that I have put pen to paper in hopefully helping to ease the eternal problem which confronts devotees of exhibition livestock with the vexing problem of variegation. Budgerigars, and the exhibiting of them, is in its infancy compared to the Canary world, and I feel with over 40 years experience the pit falls, and the human confrontations that marred certain colour form breeds, or types of canaries, can be learnt to the benefit of breeders/exhibitors of Pied Budgerigars.

In some breeds of Canaries such as Lancashire's, no melanin markings on the plumage, except light dappled grey crest feathers are allowed, anywhere else on the plumage showing marks whatsoever are breeding room material. Most other popular canary types have a comprehensive classification to cater for the personal tastes of all the members, but in the finality there is still a best in section. Colour canaries in the clear, ticked, and variegated section, classes provided to cover the whole spectrum in colour and markings. At one time exhibitors disagreed about validity of variegated exhibits winning over their clear counterparts, not surprising compromises had to be enforced within show rules. It's now understood by all, that when a clear, ticked or variegated comes up for best in section, and the judge or judges, feel they are equal in show quality, they *deem* the clear exhibit as superior. We have many more instances in other breeds of canaries I could mention but I feel these two short syndromes will be sufficient to make my point to VBC members.

What the modern day breeder/ exhibitor of recessive pied's has to contend with over their canary counterparts is improving the feather, size and span from the original pretty pet birds of yesteryear to the wide pansy faced bulkier exhibition Recessive Pied of today, and retaining the correct amount of melanin markings, over the lipochrome (ground colour) content. Whereas, some of the pioneers were attracted at the outset to

these vivid coloured exhibits, times have changed within the budgerigar fancy, and most other colour forms have moved on so to speak. What is well documented to improve and enlarge size and direction of feather into future recessive pied, a breeding partner of this nature must be used from an outcross of a non-pied. These foundation birds are normally cocks with a shelf life of 1 breeding season, nothing more, nothing less. The effects of these foundation bloodlines depends initially how good show quality he was, and whether he "clicks" with is breeding partner. Its been proved without question livestock breeding is about hidden factors which play a major influence in the progress of a breed, whether it's a Budgerigar or a Race horse. Once you have managed to breed these first cross carries the question to, which to retain, and which to release. To the perfectionist with ample breeding room space, use them all, but in the real world, members keep other colour forms, so space is the problem, or the lack of it! Another tradition which hampers the progress of these lovely colour forms is the continual use of violet, and other dark factor feather forms. If you suggested to exhibitors specialising in Sky Blues, to get rid of them and keep solely Violet and Mauves, the answer would be unprintable. So again compromise is the key word, the use of Grey and Grey Green had been the flagship of the many exhibitors stud of normals, so why not with Recessive Pied Specialist Breeders? Now we come to the down to the nitty gritty, once you have managed to produce visual pied youngsters from the first crosses, they vary in melanistic content, and it's the larger nest mates carry the most, so I'm led to believe, and my limited experience with visual x visual pairing. So what does the keen exhibitor do, keep these heavier marked better type birds at home, and only exhibit the lightler marked nest mates. If you show them alongside each other in their respective classes, both exhibitor and judge are in a no win position, and most importantly the bird fancy.

Whereas I've already mentioned many exhibitors of canaries have not this problem, they are blessed with an abundance of classes to choose from. Not so with many serious breeders/ exhibitors of the not so popular colour forms of budgerigar, and unfortunately the pied's in their various genetical forms are the victims of such a restrictive practices. Even in the golden years of the Exhibition Fancy in the 1960's, just starting out in this

wonderful and absorbing hobby of ours, it took me ages to convince my local CBS City of Birmingham, to increase the classes for coloured Sparrows, sorry I mean Red Factors, now they are the number one exhibited bird in the world. How did this rapid rise in popularity come about, one of the many reasons was the large classification to match the new and emerging colour forms.

As you see the classification I have drawn up for you're consideration, covers a large spectrum, it will have its critics of course, but a compromise will partly be a benefit of all concerned. The questions you might answer are, will breeders of normal's might be attracted to Pied's knowingly they would have more classes to exhibit in. Secondly, will specialist breeders of Pied's exhibit more in the show team with this no restriction and relaxed classification. And to the newcomer to the fancy with a competitive nature seeing more Pied's on the show bench take up the challenge. To try and keep our hobby and make it more attractive to newcomers, some of the old theories need to be thrown into the dustbin where they belong. The old chestnut of egg before the chicken is still prevalent in some quarters, even today. Whatever the specialist groups or breed advocate should be listened to and acted upon, by the governing body. Then it is up to the group to back up their convictions and the responsibility is then shifted to its members. Will members of this club support their officers in such a venture in an all pied Show? And perhaps having more classes at least at the BS Show, only time will tell. To conclude. How manay newer members have see these mysterious Dark-Eyed Clears on the Show Bench, my guess is not many!, Why is this so?
